

Walk with me. This watery land is designated as the Peninsula Drainage District. It is a managed landscape has many names and no name at all. Historically, this area has been viewed as a disposal wasteland. Yet it has been the site of an Indigenous Wapato gathering ground, the shipworkers' City of Vanport, the Japanese Relocation Center, stockyards, a meatpacking plant, West Delta Park, the Portland International Raceway, and a golf course.

The map changes almost every decade with shifting lakes, sloughs, and wetlands. Walk with me and experience this place with respect and possibly, with some new understanding.
